



Meals Served [Full-Service]	1	lbs/meal
Meals Served [Limited-Service]	0.5	lbs/meal
Employees [Full-Service]	3,000	lbs/employee/year
Employees [Limited-Service]	2,200	lbs/employee/year
Disposed Waste ¹ [Full-Service]	66	% of disposed waste by weight
Disposed Waste ¹ [Limited-Service]	51	% of disposed waste by weight

Food Waste Estimation Guide



Sample calculations reflect ½ ton food waste per week

If you are a full-service restaurant with **17 employees**, then:

3,000 lbs/employee/year * 17 full-time employees = 51,000 lbs food waste generated/year

51,000 lbs/year ÷ 52 weeks/year = 981 lbs/week = 0.5 ton of food waste per week

If you have **150 guest rooms**, then:


345.64 lbs/room/year * 150 rooms = 51,846 lbs/year

 $51,846 \, lbs/year \div 52 \, weeks/year = 997 \, lbs/week = 0.5 \, ton of food waste per week$

SOURCE REDUCTION OF FOOD WASTE GUIDANCE

The US EPA's Food Recovery Hierarchy ranks source reduction at the top of its priorities as a strategy to reduce wasted food. Businesses should consider how each strategy on the EPA hierarchy can contribute to a comprehensive food waste reduction plan. While this guidance focused on preventing food waste, other RecyclingWorks guidance addresses food donation and source separation of food material for composting, anaerobic digestion or animal feed.



SOURCE SEPARATION GUIDANCE

The RecyclingWorks in Massachusetts program has worked with local health officials to develop recommended Best Management Practices (BMPs) for use by health agents to support and inform local oversight of commercial food waste collection programs. The commercial organics waste disposal ban affects any business or institution that disposes of one ton or more of food waste per week, effective October 1, 2014. Effective November 1, 2022, the MassDEP is lowering the threshold for the commercial organics ban so that it applies to businesses and institutions generating one-half ton or more food waste per week. These BMPs are also intended to serve as a resource to businesses and institutions and their haulers. This is not regulatory language and these practices may need to be modified to fit varying site specific conditions. The RecyclingWorks program will consider revising the BMPs in the future as needed. Any suggestions should be sent to Info@recyclingworksma.com.

Applies to all textiles including bedding, clothing, curtains, fabric, footwear, towels, and similar items.

Must be dry and free of mold, bodily fluids, insects, oil, or hazardous substances.

Blue Q

Donates thousands of items to **ServiceNet**, a human services organization in Western Massachusetts.

Items include excess, new inventory of toothbrushes, socks, oven mitts, and dish towels.

RecyclingWorks connected Blue Q to the Massachusetts Housing and Shelter Association

MassDEP Disposal Ban on Mattresses


Applies to mattresses and box springs. Excludes mattress pads, toppers, pillows, sofa beds and futons.

Must be dry and free of mold, bodily fluids, insects, oil, or hazardous substances.

Mattress Recycling

At processing facilities, mattresses are inspected and treated for bed bugs.
Deconstructed through manual and mechanical processes.

Materials are separated and sent for recycling or repurposing.



Technical Tips for Starting a Mattress Recycling Program

Keep them dry and as clean as possible

Drop off: call ahead to confirm

Pick up: minimum quantity likely. Live-load from garage or storage container, or storage trailer swap

On site dismantling may be available if too dirty for pickup.

Some municipalities using mattress bags: \$10 giant bag to keep dry before it goes out on curb



Worked with LRP to recycle mattresses

Donated motel items to local shelter


